

Decision 4/CP23


The decision calls for:

Joint work on Agriculture under SBSTA and SBI, taking into consideration vulnerabilities of agriculture to climate change and approaches to address food security.

It aims to achieve this through, inter alia:


- Workshops and expert meetings; and
- Collaboration with constituted bodies under the Convention.

SBSTA/SBI are requested to report back to COP 26 (November 2020)



Decision 4/CP23



However, the three-year period may not signify the end of the KJWA: many Parties expect the SBs may define further work after 2020, pending a further COP decision.







Parties' view on topic 2(a)

Possible ways to advance in the implementation of the outcomes of the five in-session workshops [10/17]:

- financial support, enhancement of market mechanisms and investment;
- public incentives and support schemes for agriculture;
- sharing of experiences and lesson learned;
- support to national strategies and plans aiming at adapt and mitigate climate change;
- cost-efficiency technology development and access; and
- building capacities and know-how.

Appropriate modalities for implementation should be identified by each Party in accordance with its respective needs and taking into account country-specific environmental and cultural conditions [5/17].



Parties' view on topic 2(a)

Priority actionable areas [10/17]:

- early warning systems, seasonal forecast for agriculture and agro-meteorological information;
- improved **soil** carbon, health and fertility, especially in areas sensitive to salinity intrusion, drought, and erosion;
- efficient land use and water management to increase efficiency in irrigation;
- improved nutrient use and agricultural waste management towards sustainable and resilient agricultural systems;
- climate information services for smallholders for crop and livestock management;
- agroforestry;
- risk assessments and mappings of vulnerability of agricultural production.



Parties' view on the workshop topic 2(a) at SB 49 [7/17]

Expected output from the workshop:

a <u>report</u> [3/17], in the form of a summary or technical guidance showcasing best practices and their implementation framework, including:

- a diagnosis of analysed problems and difficulties faced during such activities;
- information on the modality (e.g. technology transfer, capacity building, financial assistance, knowledge-sharing, the development of technical paper) in which support could be provided;
- best practices and case studies on activities related to agriculture and ad hoc and long-term solutions;
- assessments of cost-effectiveness;
- links to the implementation of **NDCs**, **NAPs** and other programmes/plans prepared within the UNFCCC context, as well as potential links to the implementation of **SDGs**.



Oberver submissions

Observers' view on topic 2(a)

Possible modalities of implementation of the outcomes of the five in-session workshops [14/14]:

- enhance access to climate finance for agricultural sector, particularly for least developed and developing countries;
- increase investment in research and scientific interdisciplinary knowledge production;
- facilitate knowledge exchange and develop good practices, national policies and guidance in line with national priorities identified in the NDCs.

Importance to identify **appropriate modalities** [3/14] for focused and coherent geographical units, considering local governments, producers' organizations, private sector, local sectoral authorities, civil society, non-profit organizations, cooperatives, research institutions, etc.



Observers' view on the workshop topic 2(a) at SB 49 [8/14]

The workshop should:

- enable wide participation of the CBs under the Convention, other bodies, international institutions and agencies under the UN, as well as other observers, such as civil society;
- identify examples of good practices or approaches or policies ready to be scaled up, considering food security, gender equality, human rights, and ecosystem integrity;
- identify **key needs for implementation**, including finance, technology and capacity building to **help farmers** to understand better how they can orient their agricultural practices to become more **climate-resilient and climate friendly**.
